

Impact of Health Centers' 340B Savings

June 2021

The 340B Drug Pricing Program (340B) enables health centers to offer prescription medications at significantly reduced costs for their patients, many of whom may lack insurance coverage and/or suffer from complex chronic conditions and would otherwise go without these crucial medications. The savings from 340B generate increased revenue for participating health centers, allowing them to expand patient services and programs. To better understand how these funds are used, NACHC recently surveyed health centers.

340B Savings Have Enabled Health Centers to:


Provide nearly 420,000 affordable medications to 30,000 uninsured patients to expand primary care, behavioral health, dental and supportive services to serve 11,250 new patients. The savings have also funded the optimization of a new EMR (EPIC), purchasing system software, and the expansion of telehealth activities.




Be one of the only sites in their area to offer dentures at deep discounts, and provide podiatry and nutrition services as well as medication adherence programs and medication therapy management services.

Offer free blood pressure medications, diabetic medications and multivitamins to all patients, provide free 340B drug delivery to rural sites, and dispensed more than \$38,000 in free medication to homeless patients.
